WHAT IS A NATIONAL HERITAGE AREA?

According to the National Park Service, "National Heritage Areas (NHAs) are designated by Congress as places where natural, cultural, and historic resources combine to form a cohesive, nationally important landscape....NPS partners with, provides technical assistance, and distributes matching federal funds from Congress to NHA entities. NPS does not assume ownership of land inside heritage areas or impose land use controls." That doesn't sound menacing, does it?

WHAT'S THE PROBLEM THEN?

We have researched the 55 existing National Heritage Areas and provide detailed concerns in this brochure under WHY WE OPPOSE THE NHA. To sum them up, they include property rights concerns, lack of transparency, no public accountability, more government bureaucracy, solution looking for a problem, continuous drain on taxpayers and fix our National Parks first.



WHY WE OPPOSE THE NHA

PROPERTY RIGHTS CONCERNS

Despite language in an NHA designation supposedly designed to protect private property rights, local government officials are pressured to pass zoning laws and regulations not otherwise needed in order to support the NHA management plan. This impairs the right of private property owners to use and enjoy their properties as they see fit.

LACK OF TRANSPARENCY

Private land is included within the NHA boundaries without the owner's consent. No notification is given to landowners of NHA management actions.

NO PUBLIC ACCOUNTABILITY

A private, non-elected organization will manage the NHA. This organization is not accountable to the public for their management actions.

MORE BUREAUCRACY

Control of the NHA by a non-governmental organization and National Park Service oversight adds another layer of government bureaucracy.

SOLUTION LOOKING FOR A PROBLEM

Local, state and federal regulations and programs and private nonprofits already exist to promote the economy and preserve the history and heritage of Central Montana. NHA designation duplicates those efforts.

CONTINUOUS DRAIN ON TAXPAYERS

None of the National Heritage Areas in existence have become self-sufficient and are chronically dependent upon additional federal funding at taxpayer expense.

FIX OUR NATIONAL PARKS FIRST

National Heritage Areas funnel resources away from the National Park Service's main mission of taking care of already existing national parks. NPS money is better spend toward backlogs of over \$131 million and \$585 million in Glacier and Yellowstone National Parks respectively.

BIG SKY COUNTRY NATIONAL HERITAGE AREA BACKGROUND

Originally called Upper Missouri River NHA. At one time, the proposed boundaries went to Gates of the Mountains in Lewis and Clark County and included portions of Fergus and Phillips County. The latter two counties were dropped when county residents, realizing the pitfalls of the NHA, spoke up against it. We must do the same for Cascade and Chouteau Counties.

CASCADE COUNTY: 2711 square miles/more than 1.7 million acres. ALL WITHIN THE NHA CHOUTEAU COUNTY: Portage, Floweree and Missouri River corridor all the way to Loma.
